Jobs for the garden in July & August

Another gardening year is well under way. In my case, runner and dwarf beans have proved difficult to germinate as has been some brassicas. Cucumbers were slow to start producing fruits. This is possibly due to the many cold nights that have prevailed during the Spring and early Summer, with the exception a just a few nights when it was too warm to sleep. Around us, there has been few sightings of young birds, just a family of blue tits and a robin. Parent birds have been seen carrying food away from our feeding stations and off the garden, so there were a good number of nestlings hatched, but have they survived? At the time of writing we seem to have a plague of tiny black beetles. They present themselves on our white outside walls, white and other light coloured flowers and on the laundry while on the line. Annoyingly they also take a liking to me – fortunately they don't bite!

- Plant Autumn flowering bulbs – Colchicum, Sternbergia, Nerine.
- Raise the blades on the mower now when cutting the lawn.
- Clean foliage and remove any dead leaves from house plants.
- Regularly dead head flowers to promote new flowers.
- Camellias and rhododendrons should be well watered with rain water, particularly those in tubs, to produce next year's flower buds.
- Prune magnolias.
- Keep the hoe going.
- Early potatoes should be ready now.
- Harvest courgettes and beans regularly and also make the most of all young vegetables; lift onions and garlic when foliage starts to turn yellow.
- Feed tomatoes, peppers and melons with high potash fertilizer and cucumbers with nitrogen feed.
- Cover brassicas with a fine mesh to protect them from caterpillars.
- Take semi-ripe cuttings from herbs such as rosemary, sage and thyme.
- Cut canes of summer fruiting raspberries to the ground. Select 6 to 8 strong, new green canes at each root and tie them to the wire supports 10cm apart, then cut out all the others.
- Apples, pears and plums will naturally drop some fruit in June but additional thinning by hand may be necessary.
- Make new strawberry beds.
- Sow Spring cabbage.
- Ensure frogs, toads, newts and other animals can exit ponds
- Allow some seed heads and berries to develop for wildlife.
- Do not destroy wasp nests unless their location is dangerous to you, they will help ladybirds and ants to dispose of aphids, and in addition take small caterpillars back to their nest.
- Sow biennial plant seed now – foxgloves, teasels, wallflowers – these will flower early next year and will help feed pollinators.
- Sit back and enjoy your garden when weather permits.

Whilst doing so, give some thought to entering some flowers fruit and/or vegetables in the horticultural on Saturday 5th September.

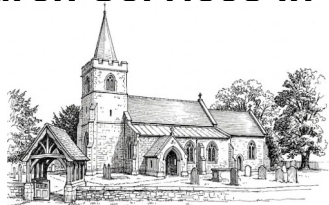

An article from Revd. Mark : St Paul – a prophet for our times?

If you have ever been to a church wedding, then it is quite possible that you have heard a reading from St. Paul's first letter to the Corinthians. Chapter 13 is often read at such events, mostly because it reflects on the nature of love and how, at the start of a marriage, we all have hopes and dreams that this will be a wonderful union between two people, despite the unexpected events that will always pop up.

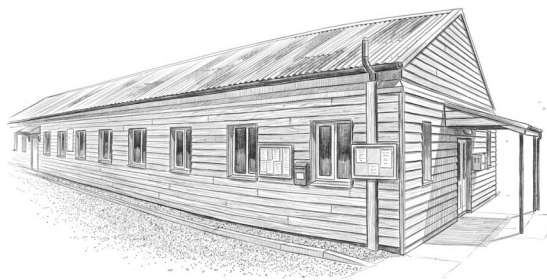
But St Paul wrote a whole lot more letters, exploring his theology as a Jew who had become a follower of Jesus. The term Christian was yet to be invented. In what was probably his last extant letter, Romans, Paul tackles the great question – how are followers of Jesus to live in a society that really doesn't care for them and may even see them as a threat. He suggests that they live lives that are honest, true, serve the common good, following the laws of the land. However, they should not forget that they belong to a different worldview and so be mindful of those around them who differ in thought.

Given how polarising some people want society and culture to be – either you are for us or against us, there is no middle ground, St Paul's thoughts for a different world and a different culture seem to be surprisingly relevant! Taking the example of Abraham (Chapter 5), St Paul reminds us that we are all under one God. In Chapter 12, he points to the hallmarks of a good Christian -including blessing those who persecute you! That is a real challenge to those who want hate to win over love!

St Paul's vision is not perfect, but it does offer us a template to challenge these divisive times, offering a unity and inclusiveness that many in this world would disdain in the search for a quick buck and a comment section full of outrage.

Book of the month for July/August

The book I would like to recommend this time is "The Wager" by David Grann. At first I thought it would be about a bet but it turns out to be the name of an Eighteenth Century ship.

This is the true story of a British Naval secret expedition which went disastrously wrong and ended up with one of its ships being wrecked and the members of the crew who survived being marooned on a desolate island with little or nothing to sustain them.

The way that some of them survived in spite of falling out with each other and eventually succeeded in getting back to England only to face court-martials is graphically described and is only possible to understand because some of them kept journals.

The first part of the book gives a fascinating glimpse of what it was like to be a sailor on one of these ships and how the captain had, literally, the power of life or death over his crew. So discipline had to be strict and whether it was a "happy ship" or not depended to a large extent on the personality of the captain.

An outstanding work of non-fiction and well worth reading.

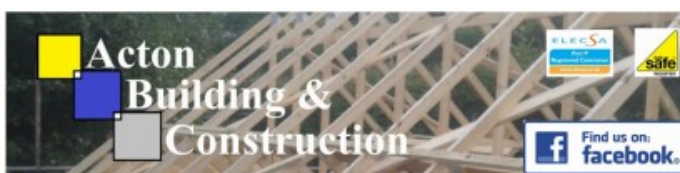

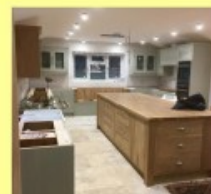

Wildlife Walk



On the muggy afternoon of 14th June around 13 participants met at Much Birch Community Hall for the Wildlife Walk, led by Andrew Nixon, who is a local resident with a long career in Conservation. Our route was to take us down Holly Bush Lane to the sunken path, then up to Little Birch church, before dropping down below Athelstan's Wood and crossing the fields back towards Much Birch Community Hall.

After a short welcome and briefing from Chris Fowler and David Irwin (Footpath Officers) we crossed the A49, slipped behind the roadside houses and almost immediately found ourselves in the midst of beautifully rural views with arable crops, grassland, woodland and hedgerows all spread out before us.

At regular stops, Andrew highlighted species of interest but also described some of the threats facing them. Modern farming practices, challenges caused by climate change and tree diseases such as Ash Die Back and Dutch Elm Disease were amongst the topics that Andrew covered. He also explained the need to ensure that areas of wildlife value remain connected so that species which don't move well in open farmland (such as snails or Hazel Dormice) can avoid the genetic isolation of being stranded in 'islands' of remaining good habitat.

One such species highway is the sunken path itself. In addition to being a beautiful footpath for us, it links other important wildlife features, includes many ancient 'veteran' trees and is an irreplaceable home for many types of flora and fauna. Andrew also enthusiastically showed us various examples of conservation 'best practice' which had been adopted by local farmers. Examples included species-rich grass meadows, pond restoration, low-impact grazing, and tree-planting for parkland landscape restoration. We all were able to appreciate how these benefit the wildlife that we are blessed with having so close to home!

After looping back to the village, we enjoyed a social catch-up and much needed tea and cake, courtesy of Chris and David's wives Wendy and Charlotte

Thanks go to Chris and David for taking such good care of the paths that we walked, to Andrew for his knowledge and enthusiasm for the natural world, Wendy and Charlotte for the tea and cake, our fellow walkers for their company and to the many farmers and landowners who maintain all that we saw in the face of difficult economic challenges.

These walks are very sociable and gentle – if you haven't been on one before I recommend that you join the next one which will be walk around Aconbury Hill led by Ben Anderson the Head of Forestry for the Duchy this will take place sometime in August.

1. There will be an entry fee of **£3 for 1-5 entries & £5 for multiple entries. Children's entries - free**
2. All exhibits must have been grown or made by the exhibitor in the last 12 months, except in the Floral Art (Section 4) where bought flowers may be used.
3. Any person exhibiting articles belonging to another person, or attempting to deceive the Judges, will be disqualified.
4. The decision of the Judges is final and/ or the Show Secretary and they will settle any disputes that are not covered by the rules.
5. **ALL ENTRIES** should be on an entry form or similar format plain paper and must be received at the hall between 9.00 and 10.45am.
ENTRIES WILL ONLY BE ACCEPTED UP TO 10.45am.
EXHIBITS should be staged by 11.00am on the day of the show.
For the Children's Section: each child MUST have their own entry form.

6. Exhibitors must leave the hall by 11.00am. There will be a 5 minute warning at 10.55 am. The hall will then be closed at 11.00am so that judging can commence and will open to the public at 2.00pm.
